BACKGROUND

There exist several M&E systems and sub-systems that are used for monitoring and evaluation of HIV programs for various sectors. Considering that 80% of the HIV response is funded by Development Partners, the need to harmonize the country and county reporting of HIV and AIDS activities and investment allocation and utilization is necessary. It is in this regard that the National AIDS Control Council (NACC) developed the HIV Implementing Partners Online Reporting System for Implementing Partners (HIPORS) to report on all their HIV and AIDS interventions and funding.

Main objective of the HIPORS

To harmonize the reporting for HIV and AIDS resourcing and to provide data for decision making on resource allocation to reduce duplication and promote cost effectiveness taking into account the disease burden across the different counties.

Tracking of resources for HIV and AIDS will be achieved more efficiently with a robust application that has incorporated intervention areas and sources of funding as well as geographic areas of operation. There is now a one stop shop view of the country and counties resource basket allocation and expenditure patterns with regard to intervention areas.

Specific objectives of the HIPORS

- ✓ Mapping of implementing partners and their interventions in the counties.
- ✓ Tracking HIV and AIDS resource allocation in the counties
- ✓ Enhancing prudent allocation and utilization of resources for the HIV response by the counties.
- ✓ To incorporate intervention areas and sources of funding as well as geographic areas of operation
- ✓ To harmonize the country and county reporting of HIV and AIDS activities and investment

Roll out Status.

All the counties have been trained in HIPORS and the reporting for the past three years indicate a modest improving trend.

ANALYSIS REPORT

1. Overall reporting rates

The number and quality of reports have mostly improved in the FY 2016/17 compared to the last reporting year. In the FY 2016/17, a total of 50 (12%) of all the 411 HIV NGOs reported funding support across 46 counties. This was a slight increase in reporting compared with 7% reporting rate in FY 2014/15 and 10% in FY 2015/16. From a recent field supervisory meeting conducted, we noted 102 active implementing partners. This implies that the reporting rate was 47% among the active implementing partners. Of the 50 NGOs that reported, 28 (56%) reported as per the deadline of 31st July 2017, a decline from 76% timely reporting in the last FY.

2. Number of Implementing Partners on HIPORS by county and HIV and AIDS support.

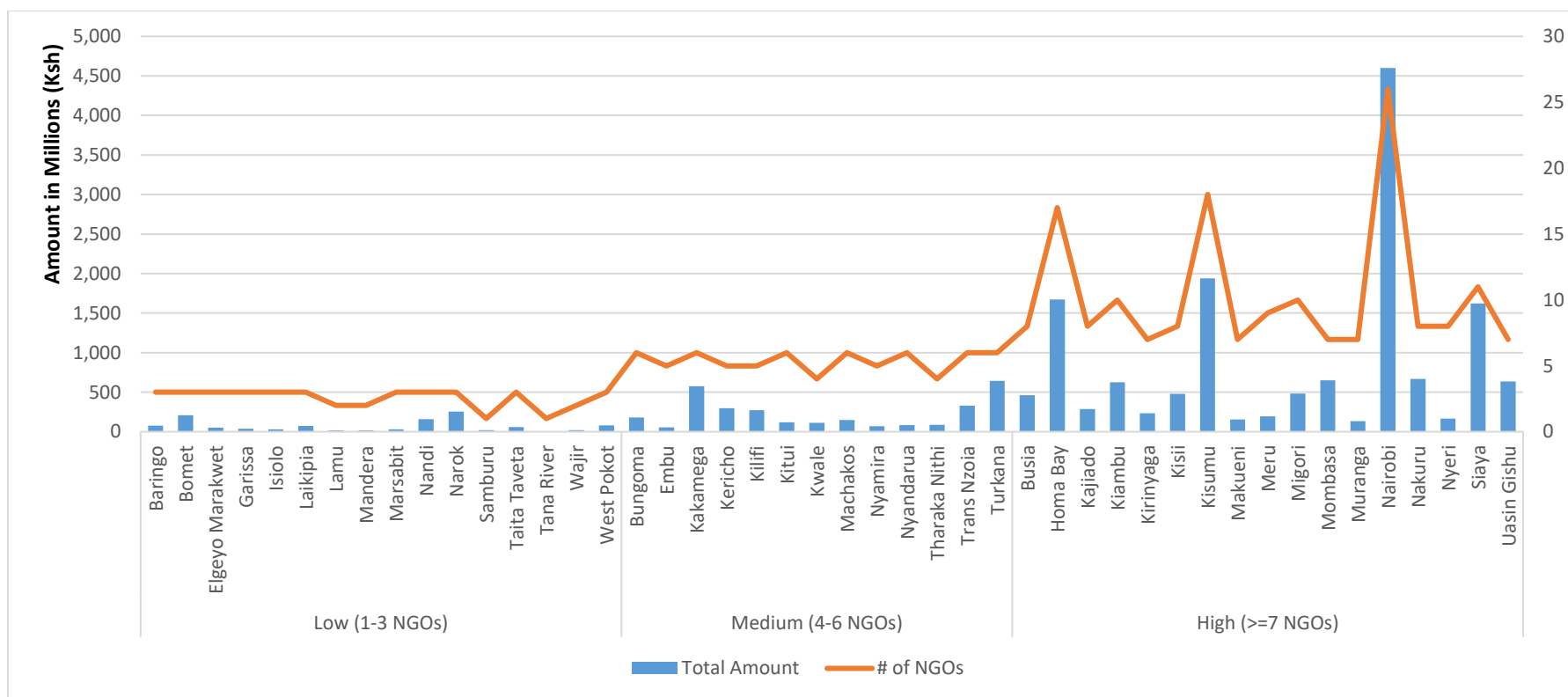


Figure 1: Number of partners per county and HIV funding support in KES millions

There was heterogeneity in the number of implementing partners across the counties among the 48 reporting in the FY 2016/17 (see Annex 1). Counties with low (1-3 IP) number of partners had funding support ranging from 1.6m – 254.4m, while medium (4-6 IP) had 55.1m – 642.6m. On the other hand, counties with high (≥ 7) number of partners had funding support ranging from 132.5m to 4.5 billion. (Figure 1).

3. PLHIV per county and HIV Funding support.

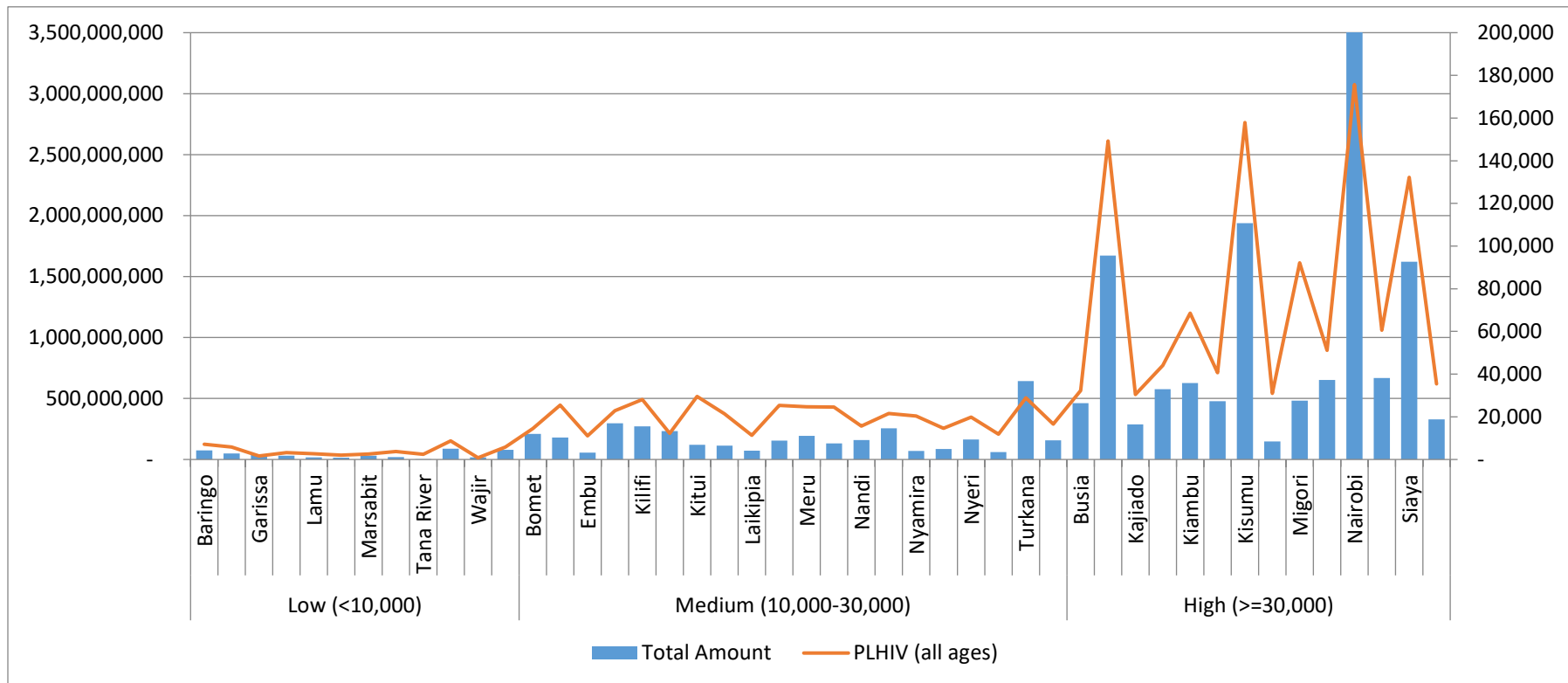


Figure 2: PLHIV per county and HIV funding support in Ksh millions

Whereas there is heterogeneity in the number of PLHIV across the counties, there is mixed level of funding support across the counties. A number of counties with high number of PLHIV ($\geq 30,000$), had low funding support i.e., Migori, Mombasa, Kakamega, Nakuru, Kiambu, Kajiado, and Trans Nzoia. We also observed low funding levels among a number of medium (10,000-30,000) and low ($< 10,000$) PLHIV counties. (Figure 2).

4. Number of new infections per county and HIV Funding support.

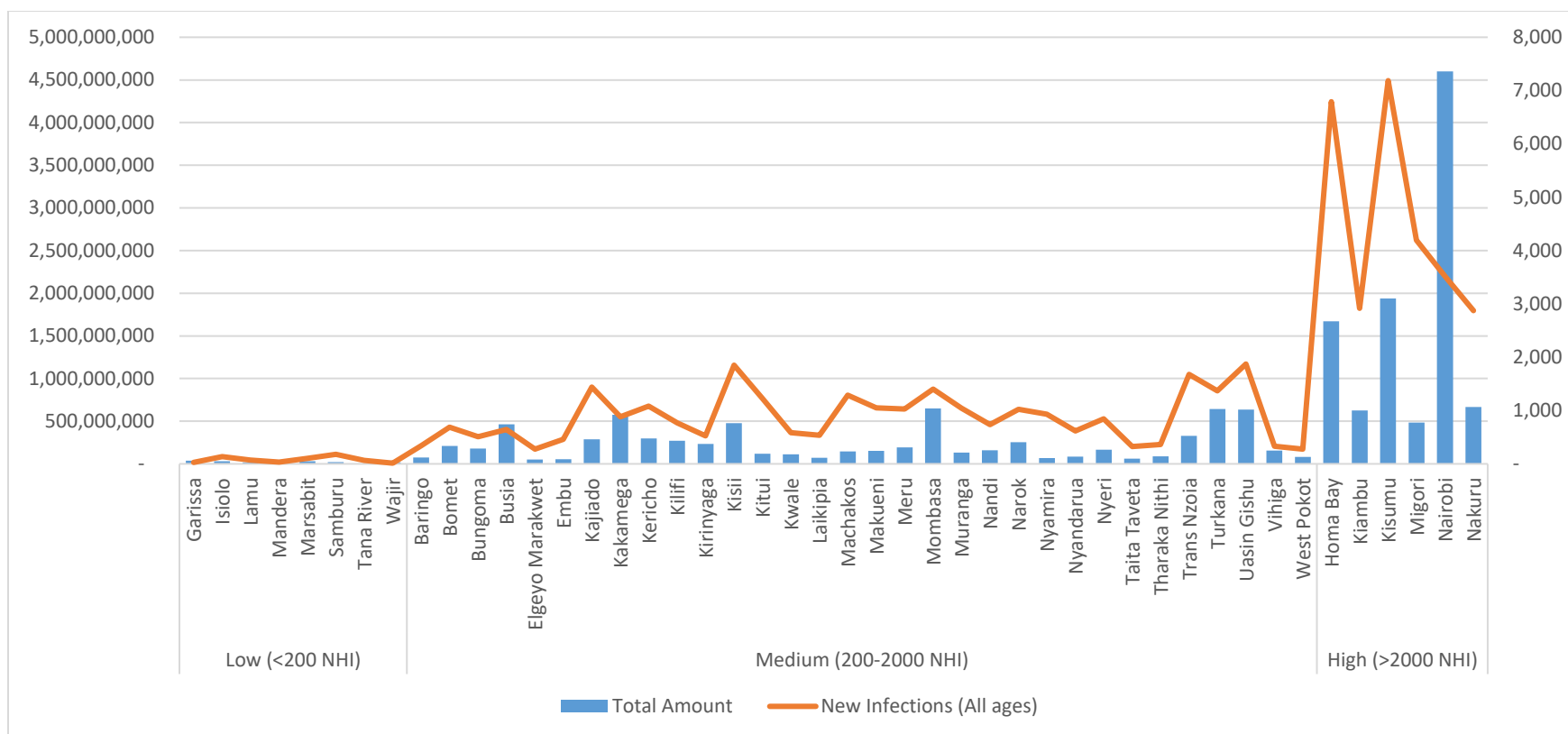


Figure 3: New HIV infections per county and HIV funding support in Ksh millions

During the FY 2016/17, there were mixed level of funding in the counties compared to the degree of new HIV infections across the counties. Some high burden counties (Kiambu, Migori, Nakuru) had low levels of funding support. (Figure 3).

5. Population size per county and HIV Funding support

A number of high populous counties (>1,000,000) had modest funding levels lower than KES 500 million. Whereas this could be viewed in the light of the fact that some of them are low-to-medium prevalence counties (Trans Nzoia, Narok, Muranga, Meru, Machakos, Kitui, Kisii, Kilifi, Bungoma, Migori and Kiambu), the low funding could hamper delivery of population-level interventions. (Figure 4).

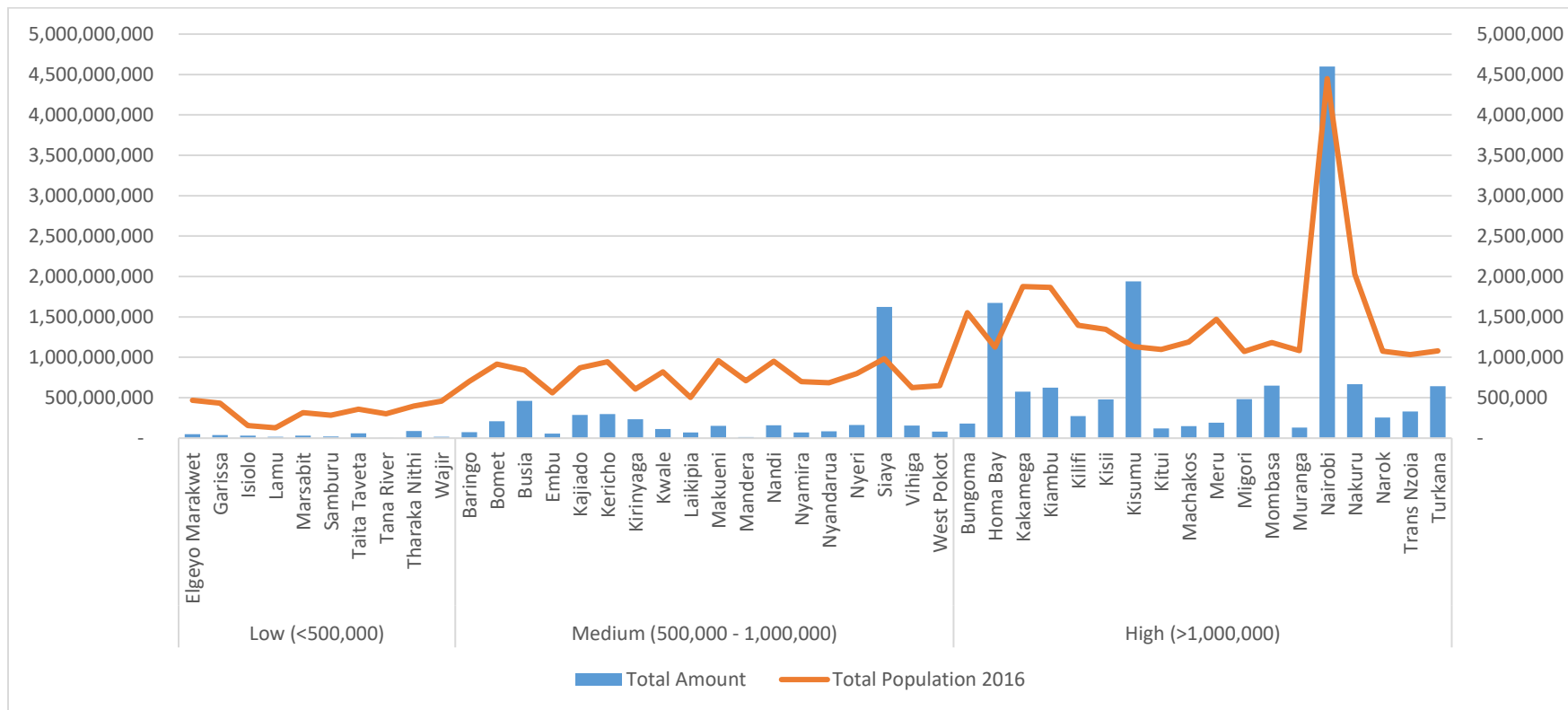


Figure 4: Total population per county and HIV funding support in Ksh millions

6. Resources available Vs county CASPS gaps

When we compared the financial support that each county received versus the 2016/17 County targets as per the respective County AIDS Strategic Plans (CASPs), two (2) counties (Mombasa, Uasin Gishu) had implementing partners reporting resources that surpassed their 2016/17 resource needs (shaded in green). Nine (9) counties (shaded in yellow) had funding gap of 14% - 80% relative to their CASP targets, while thirty-five (35) counties (shaded in blue) had funding gap >80%. (Figure 2). The evidence on unmet

financial need, would become more informative with increase in reporting rates (which stands at 10% and 47% for all registered IP, and active IP respectively). Although this report suggest two (2) counties do not need additional resources, the progress indicators in the counties may not reflect the reported resources e.g., Uasin Gishu treatment coverage, testing etc.

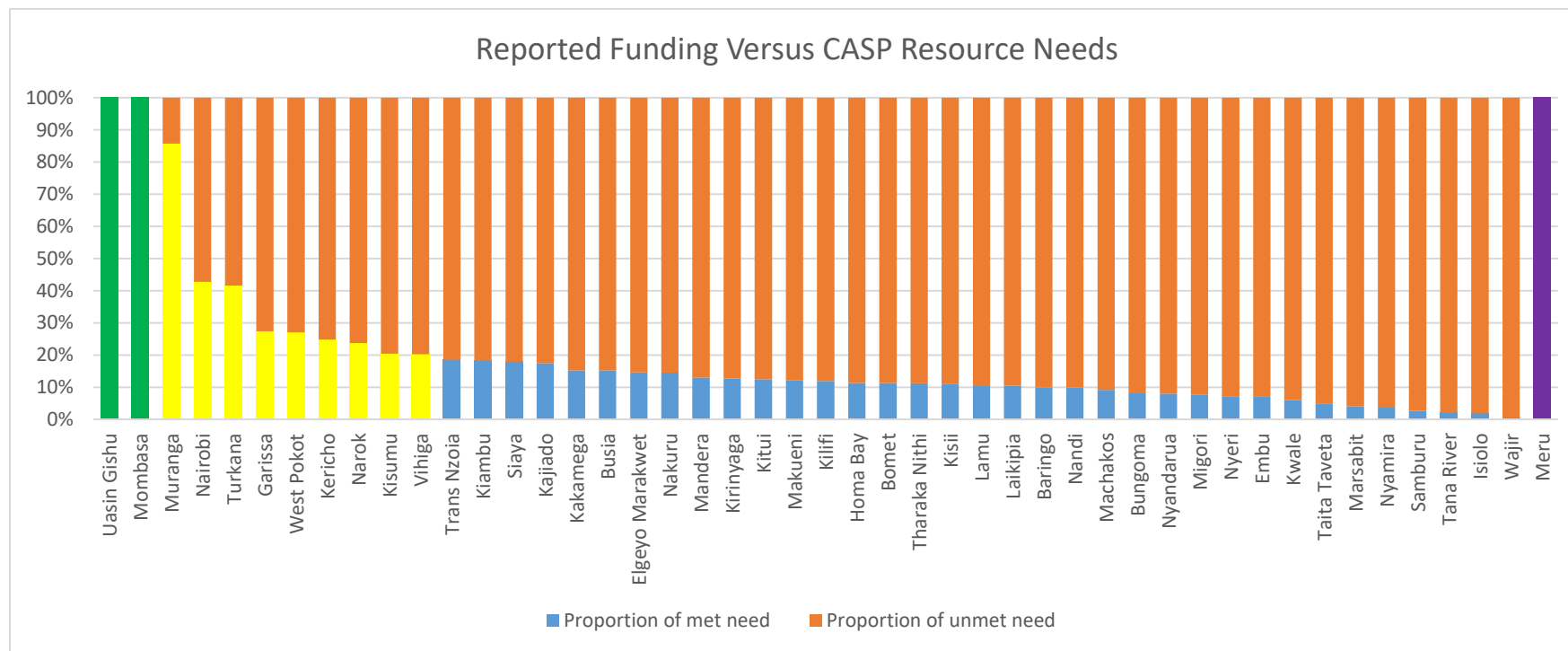


Figure 5. Reported funding versus CASP resources needs

7. Number of programmes per intervention area.

From our analysis, majority of the intervention programs were Bio-medical with fewer partners implementing behavioral and structural interventions. Table 1 below summarizes this.

8. Comparison of funding amounts and number of NGOs reporting in FY 2016/17 versus FY 20165/17

The comparison of funding amounts for FY 2016/17 versus FY 2015/16 depicts and overall increase of 35% (KES 19.3 billion vs 14.3 billion). County comparisons show mixed reactions in funding amounts in FY 2016/17 versus FY 2015/16. Seven (7) counties had reduction in amount of funding, with decline of $\geq 50\%$ in 3 counties and $< 49\%$ in 4 counties. Thirty-nine counties had

an increase in amount of funding, with increase of <49% in 9 counties, 50-100% in 7 counties, and $\geq 100\%$ in 23 counties.

In the FY 2016/17, a total of 50 (12%) of all the 411 HIV NGOs reported funding support across 47 counties. This was a slight increase in reporting compared with 10% in FY 2015/16. County comparison of number of NGOs reporting in FY 2016/17 versus FY 2015/16, reveals that 6 counties had reduction of 1-2 NGOs, 11 counties maintained the same number of NGOs, while 30 counties had an increase of 1-9 NGOs. Of the 7 counties with decrease in funding in FY 2016/17 compared to FY 2015/16, only Machakos and Elgeyo Marakwet had reduction in number of NGOs. The reduction in funding, may therefore, not be attributed to reduction in number of NGO's reporting.

9. Conclusion

1. From the report, only 12% of the registered NGOs reported through the HIPORS. The low reporting rates, remains an impediment to coordination of the HIV response as in does not reflect the factual representation of the HIV funding in Kenya and in the counties. In perspective, under-reporting of funding and interventions implemented affects the HIV response and broader health sector as follows:
 - i) The NACC in FY 2015/16 provided technical assistance to the counties to develop their costed County AIDS Strategic Plans and 46 counties have developed and launched their plans. With sub-optimal information on the available funding support from Implementing Partners, counties have a challenge to realistically plan and priorities their gaps. This affects their ability to optimize exchequer allocations and utilization of their health budgets, and thus negatively impact achievements of county targets.
 - ii) The WHO statistics report of 2013, WHO report on Public Financing for Health in Africa 2016 and the Kenya National Health Accounts Report for 2014 have cited almost 40% wastage in health sectors and advocates for plugging in the gaps and

- advocating for efficiency gains. Lack of reporting compromise the ability of the Ministry of Health to promote efficiency in health service delivery.
- iii) Coordination of HIV programmes is also a challenge and these poor reporting rates impede NACC's capacity to coordinate and harmonize the HIV response.
2. Partner focus and prioritize vis a vis County and County priorities
- i) From the report, more funding is still required across the counties. More than three-quarters of the counties still have deficits of funding in light of their epidemics. Despite the limited funding reported, a number of interventions like research and systems strengthening have only received focus by fewer Implementing Partners.
 - ii) It is also evident that majority of the Implementing partners are focused on biomedical interventions with less emphasis on behavioral and structural interventions. In some counties resources available do not match the HIV burden as well as population sizes and some counties with very high disease burdens do not have matching funds, this may be hampering the HIV response in those particular counties.
 - iii) In some counties, high levels of funding are not necessarily translating into improvements in programmatic data and having impact at community level e.g., Homabay County, where only 17 NGO's reported KES 1.67 billion for HIV response, yet there still remain challenges in scaling up treatment and prevention interventions that will ultimately reduce transmission of new HIV infections, morbidity, and mortality. Therefore, resources should follow the epidemic, and yield desired outcomes.

Next steps

1. NACC to follow-up with the NGO Board to demand compliance for all HIV NGO's.
2. NACC to provide counties with Technical Assistance to develop partner accountability frameworks to enhance efficiency of their HIV response.
3. To share the report with all stakeholders as we follow-up on the Implementing Partners who are not reporting to identify the challenges.
